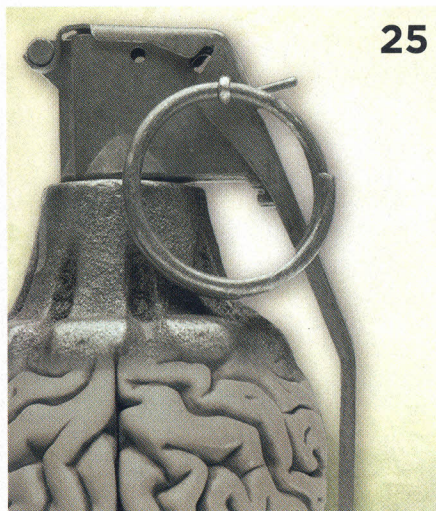
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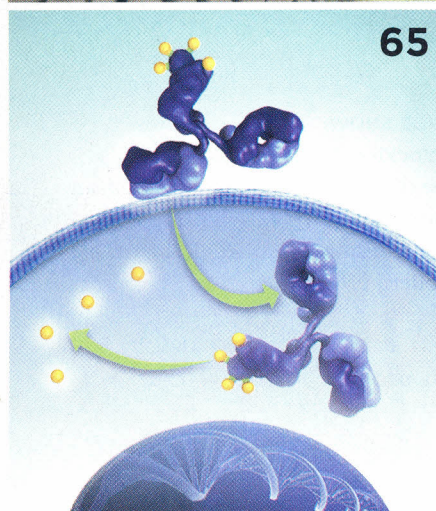
Researcher salaries continue to buck the trend of the millennium's first decade, remaining flat or even declining across most life science disciplines.
