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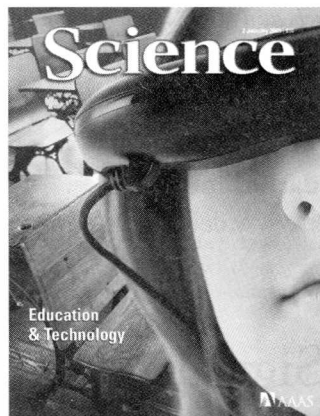

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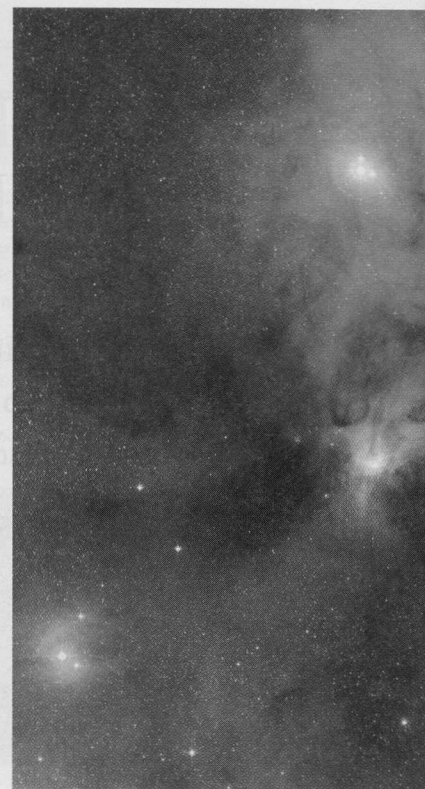
Viruses may transfer toxin genes among pathogenic bacteria in raw milk, complicating veterinary use of phage therapy as a bactericide.

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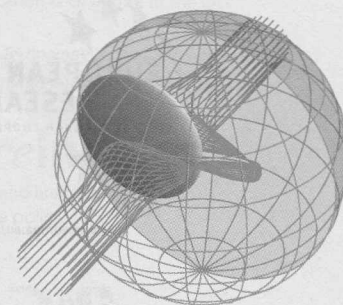
Infection of mosquitoes with a bacterium shortens their lives and reduces disease transmission, without development of resistance.

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
