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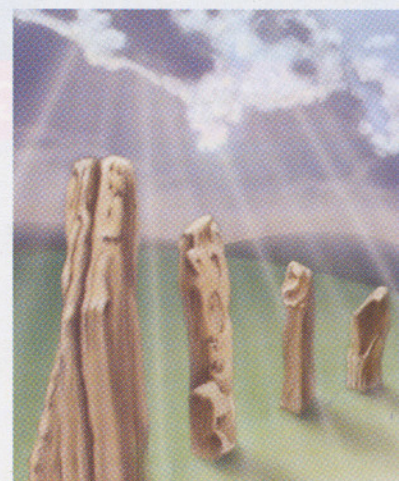

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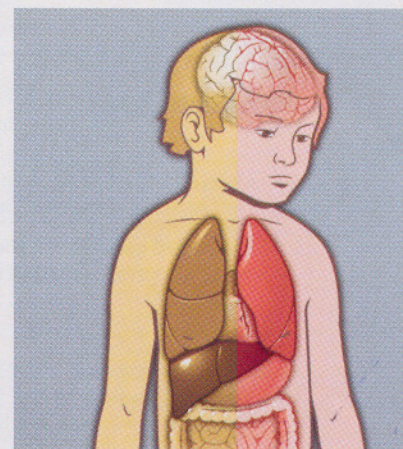

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Therapeutic administration of human serum amyloid P inhibits fibrosis progression in the mouse kidney.

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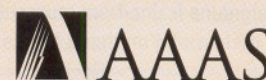
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
